Women's Institute of Torah Seminary has signed and returned the Certification and Agreement and the assurance that the institution has used, or intends to use, no less than 50 percent of the funds received under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.

Women's Institute of Torah Seminary will receive or has received a total of \$30,872 from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students.

Women's Institute of Torah Seminary disbursed \$30,000 to 75 students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act as of September 30,2020.

Women's Institute of Torah Seminary has disbursed a total of \$30,880 to 77 students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act as of December 31,2020. This total includes \$8 of institutional funds.

The estimated total number of students at the institution eligible to participate in programs under Section 484 in Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965 and thus eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act is 77.

The method used by Women's Institute of Torah Seminary to determine which students receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they would receive is based on the expenses for food, course material, equipment needed to participate in the educational program due to the disruption of campus operations, travel home expenses and health care related expenses. Dependent students were awarded \$400 grants. All students enrolled are dependent students. The remaining \$880 was awarded to two students who enrolled in Fall 2020 and had documented additional need.

Students received the following instructions with their grants: "As per the CARES Act, these grants are to be used for expenses that are related to the disruption of campus operations due to COVID-19, including things like course materials and technology as well as food, housing, health care, and childcare."
